SHORELINE EROSION INVENTORY

WINNEBAGO COUNTY LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT

- **Completed:** May 31, 2024
- **Methods:**
 - Drone: under 400 ft altitude
 - Boat: 100 - 250 ft from shore
- **Data collected:**
 - Photos w/GPS data
 - Locations of erosion
 - Locations of vegetated buffers
- **Results:**
 - 13 vegetated buffers
 - 7 erosion lines
 - ~3,623 ft total (~6% of shoreline)
- **Challenges:**
 - Water levels were high
 - Results likely underrepresent erosion frequency

AQUATIC PLANT BASELINE

- **July 2024 - point-intercept survey**
 - Presence, abundance, and diversity
 - Results inform management decisions
- **641 locations were sampled across a grid**
 - *658 predetermined sample locations (17 not accessible)*
 - *~288 feet b/w points (88 meters)*
- **Data collected included:**
 - *Species present on rake*
 - *Water depth*
 - *Rake fullness rating*
 - *Growth form rating*
 - *Dominant sediment type*
 - *Visual observations*



AQUATIC PLANT BASELINE

347 sites had plants (54% of sites)

- Widespread coverage; high density

Species found on rakes: 17

Total species observed: 24

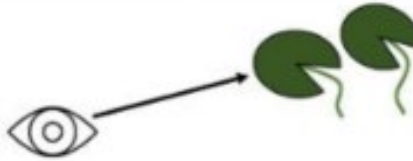
Average rake fullness: 2.05

- *Indicator of density and abundance*

Most frequently found:

- *Coontail (43.8%)*
- *Elodea (41%)*
- *Eurasian water milfoil (21.1%)*
- *Water star-grass (20.1%)*
- *Wild celery (12.2%)*



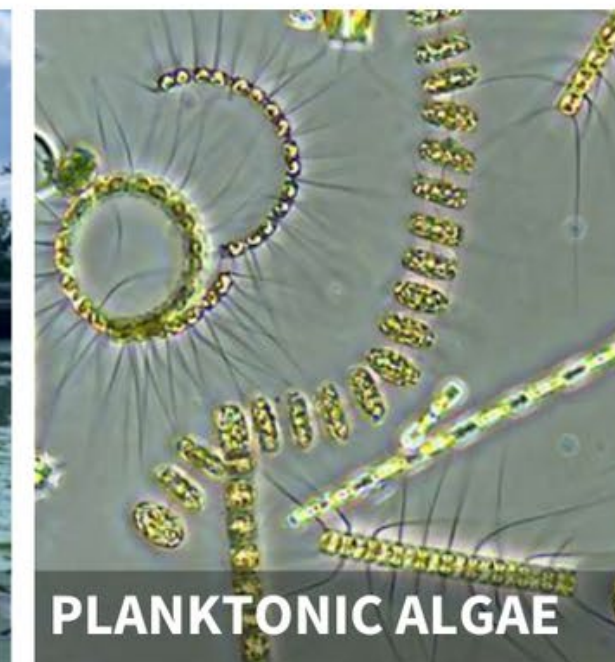
Fullness Rating	Coverage	Description
1		Only few plants. There are not enough plants to entirely cover the length of the rake head in a single layer.
2		There are enough plants to cover the length of the rake head in a single layer, but not enough to fully cover the tines.
3		The rake is completely covered and tines are not visible.
Visual		Any observed species within 6 feet (2m) of the sample site, but not collected on the rake.



AQUATIC PLANTS ARE IMPORTANT!

Foundation of a lake's ecosystem:

- Food, shelter and spawning or nesting habitat
- Produce and release oxygen
- Preserve water quality by using nutrients
- Compete with blue -green algae
- Stabilize lake sediments with their roots
- Protect and stabilize the shoreline, reducing erosion
- Compete with invasive species

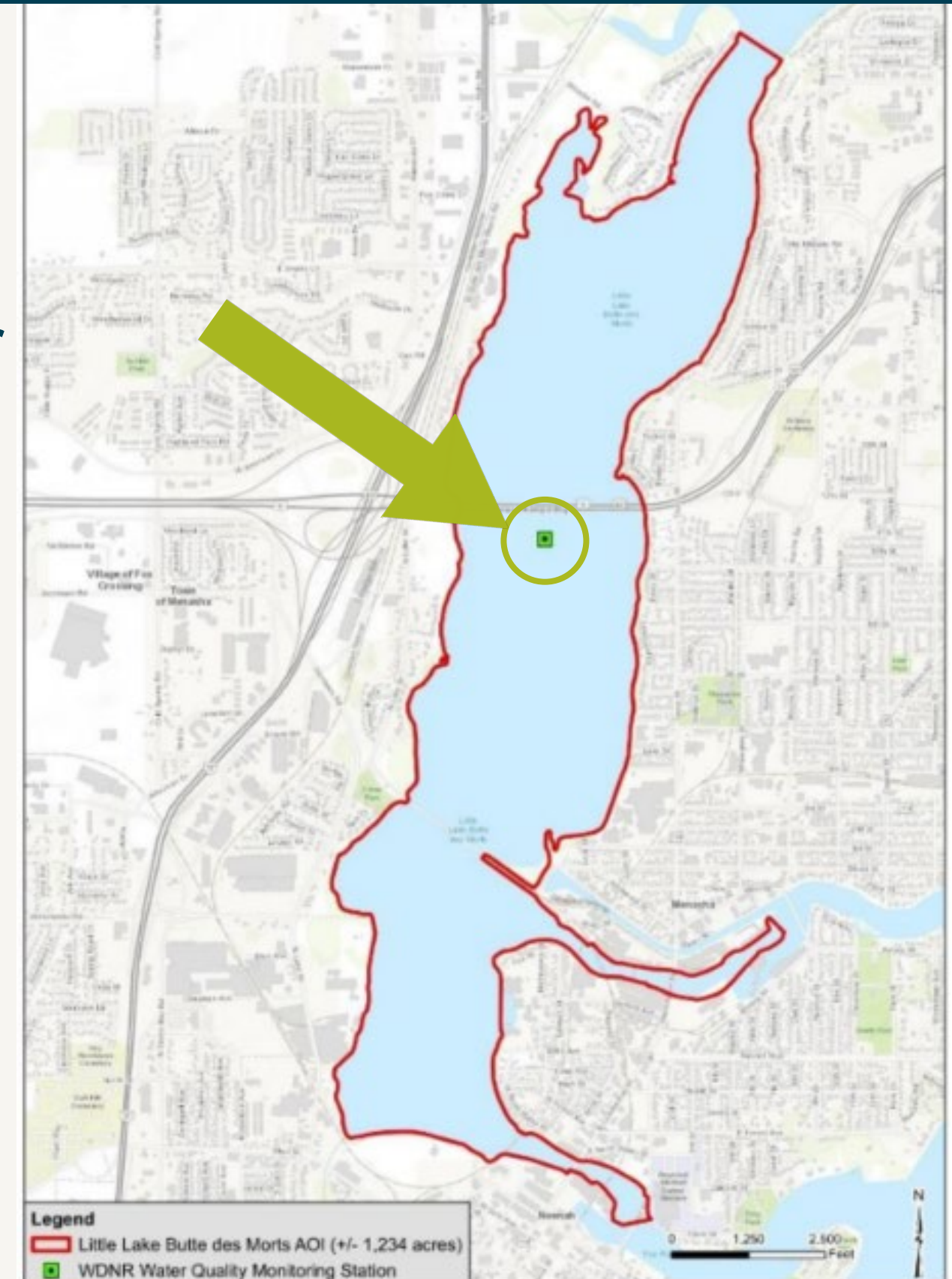


NUISANCE PLANT GROWTH



WATER QUALITY MONITORING

- **WDNR Water Quality Monitoring- 2024**
 - Deep Hole Trend Site
 - Once per month- July, August and September
- **Water samples:**
 - Total phosphorus
 - Chlorophyll a
- **Depth profiles:**
 - Water temperature
 - Dissolved oxygen
 - pH
- **Water clarity : Secchi disk depth**





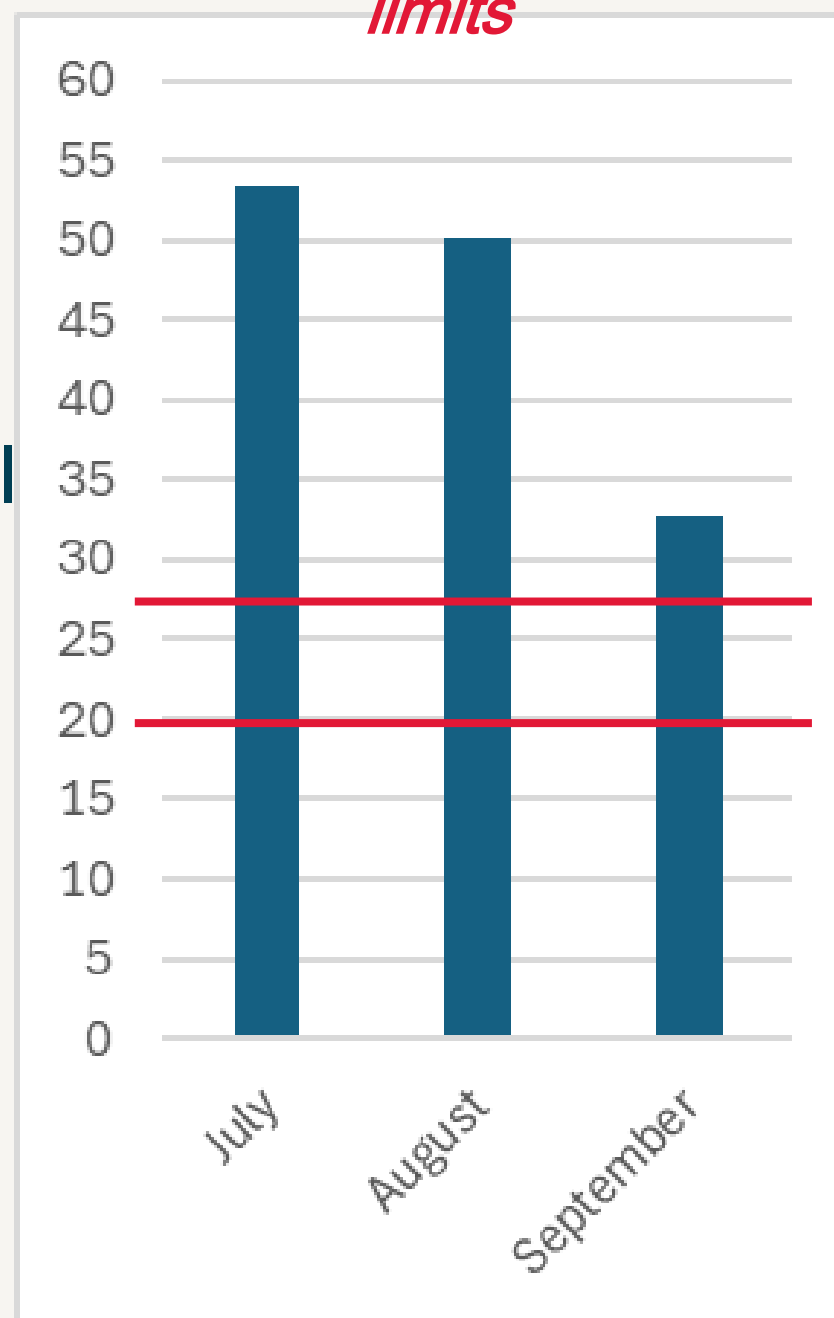
Water Quality - 2024 BASELINE

- **Chlorophyll a (chl-a)**
 - Indicator of algae growth
 - 20 ug/L = WQ recreational limit
 - 27 ug/L = WQ aquatic life limit
- **Total phosphorus (TP)**
 - Too much leads to harmful algal blooms and plant overgrowth
 - 40 ug/L = WQ threshold

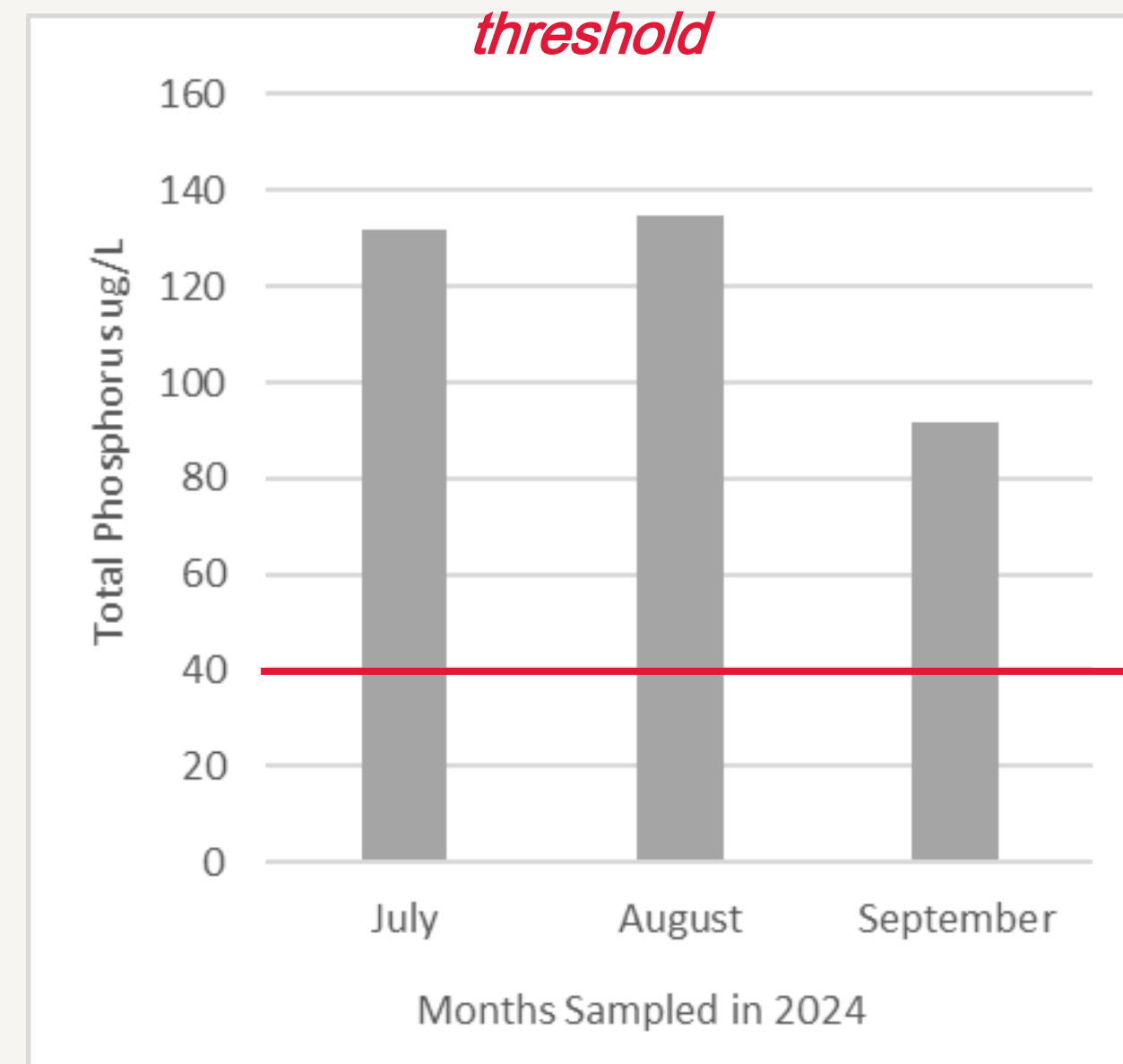

AQUATIC PLANT MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

APM STRATEGY:

- Outlines the general goals and approaches for managing aquatic plants in a lake.
- Sets the overall direction

Strategy is NOT a complete APM Plan for the whole lake.

- APM Plan is required for some permits
- Lead management entity is needed

APM PLAN:

- Specific actions and steps to achieve goals
- Implementation details
- Maps and locations of specific management methods and timing
- Needs DNR approval
- Used for permitting

- Focuses on a small portion of LLBDM
 - *Near Arrowhead Park and Herb & Dolly Smith Park*

WHAT IS MECHANICAL HARVESTING?

Equipment is used to cut areas of aquatic plants below the surface

- As plants are cut, the harvester collects and removes the material

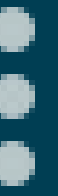
Similar to mowing the lawn.

- Plants are typically cut to depths of 0-2 ft
- Material is collected via a conveyor belt.
- Material is then offloaded on shore into a dumpster or dump truck
- Material is then disposed
 - *composted, landfilled*

WHAT IS HARVESTING?



Advantages:

- NR 109 permits can be multiyear, renewable on a 3 to 5year cycle.
- Permits generally allow harvesting to begin on June 1
 - *Protects spawning fish and fry in spring*
 - *After June 1, harvesting can occur anytime thru October w/o permit revisions*
- Leaves a portion of the plant, including roots, in place.
 - *Provides habitat and stabilizes lake bed, protecting water clarity.*
- Removal of material prevents large plant die-offs
 - *Die-offs can reduce DO and release nutrients, fueling algae blooms or plant growth*
- Lanes create edges and can enhance habitat for predator fish
- Can be used to “top cut” AIS plant growth
 - *Provides more sunlight for native plant growth; increases habitat quality.*
- Uprooted and free floating plants or algae can be surface skimmed
 - *Skimming can occur outside of the harvest lanes including removal of dense mats of filamentous algae.*
- Grants may be available for costshare equipment purchase.

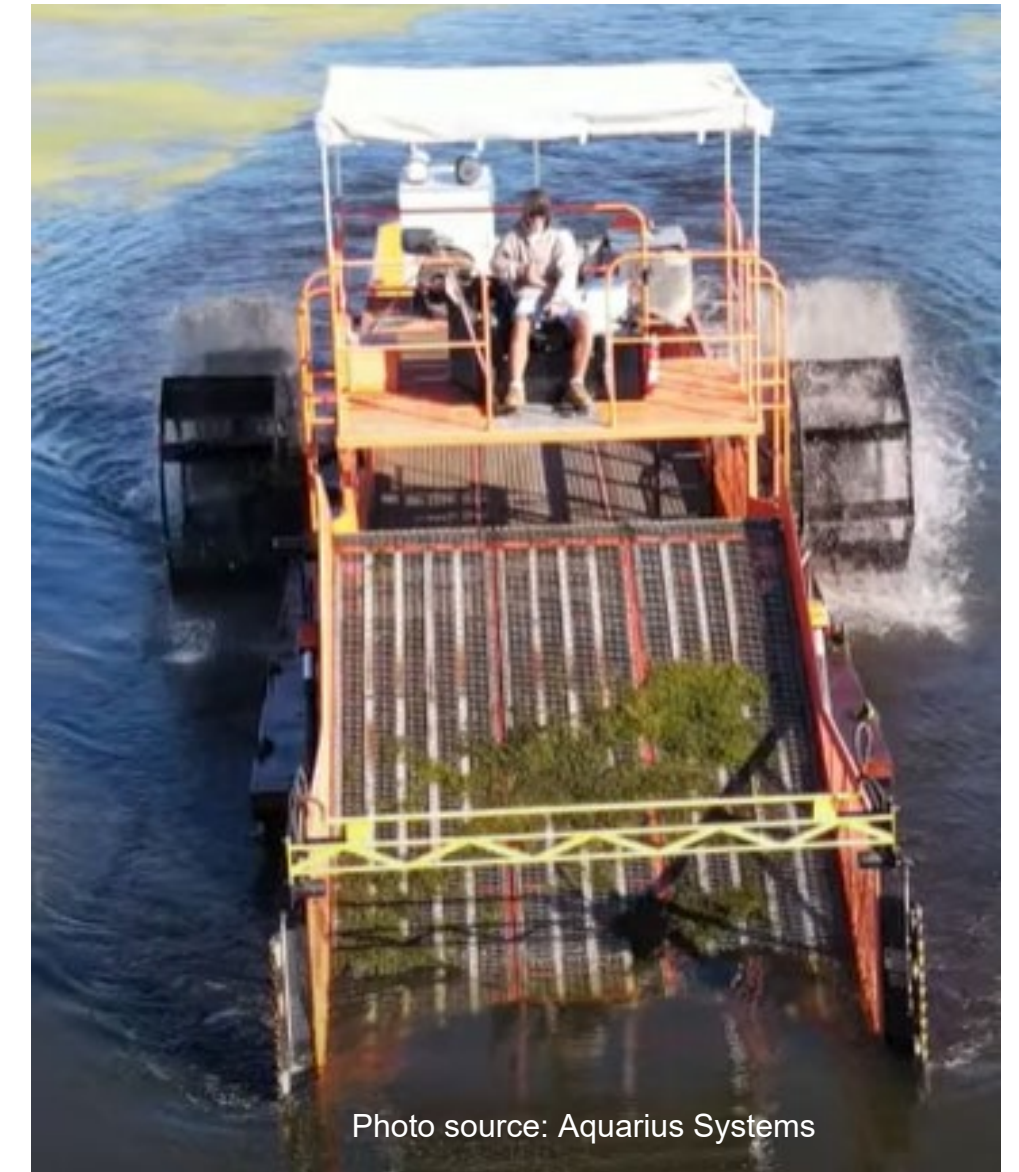
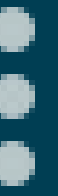

WHAT IS HARVESTING?



Disadvantages:

- Potential for plant fragmentation which can spread EWM.
- Temporary turbidity due to equipment disturbing sediment in shallow water.
- Limited by depths.
 - *Permits typically require depths greater than 3 feet of water,*
 - *Some harvesters require deeper water depending on design.*
- Difficult to navigate around docks and piers.
- Harvesting may need to be done every couple of weeks to maintain channels.
- Cost:
 - Can range from \$20,000 to over \$200,000
 - Storage, maintenance, insurance, and operator costs
 - Hiring a contractor can also be expensive.
 - *Cost estimates range from \$2001,000 per acre for contracted services.*

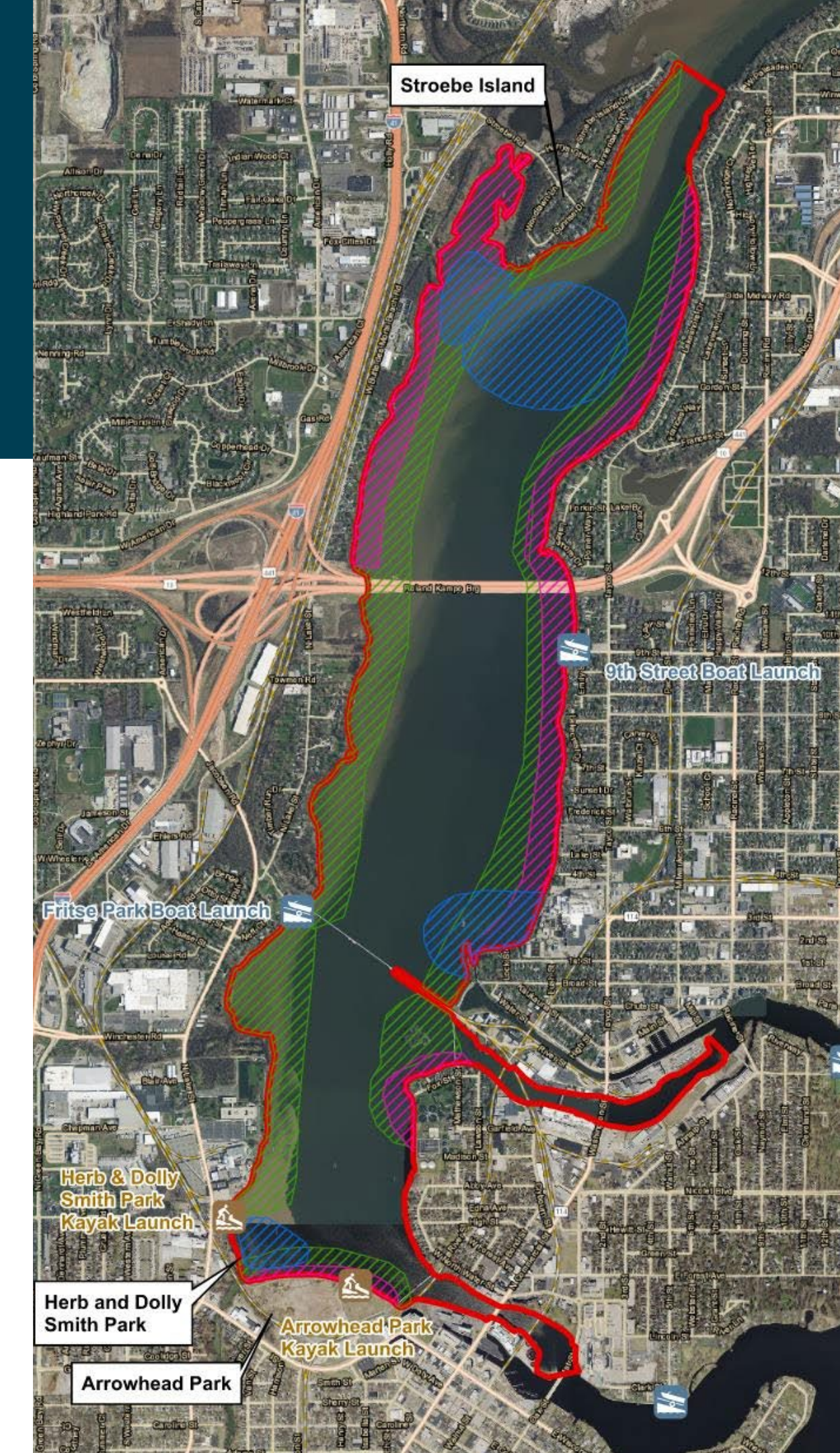

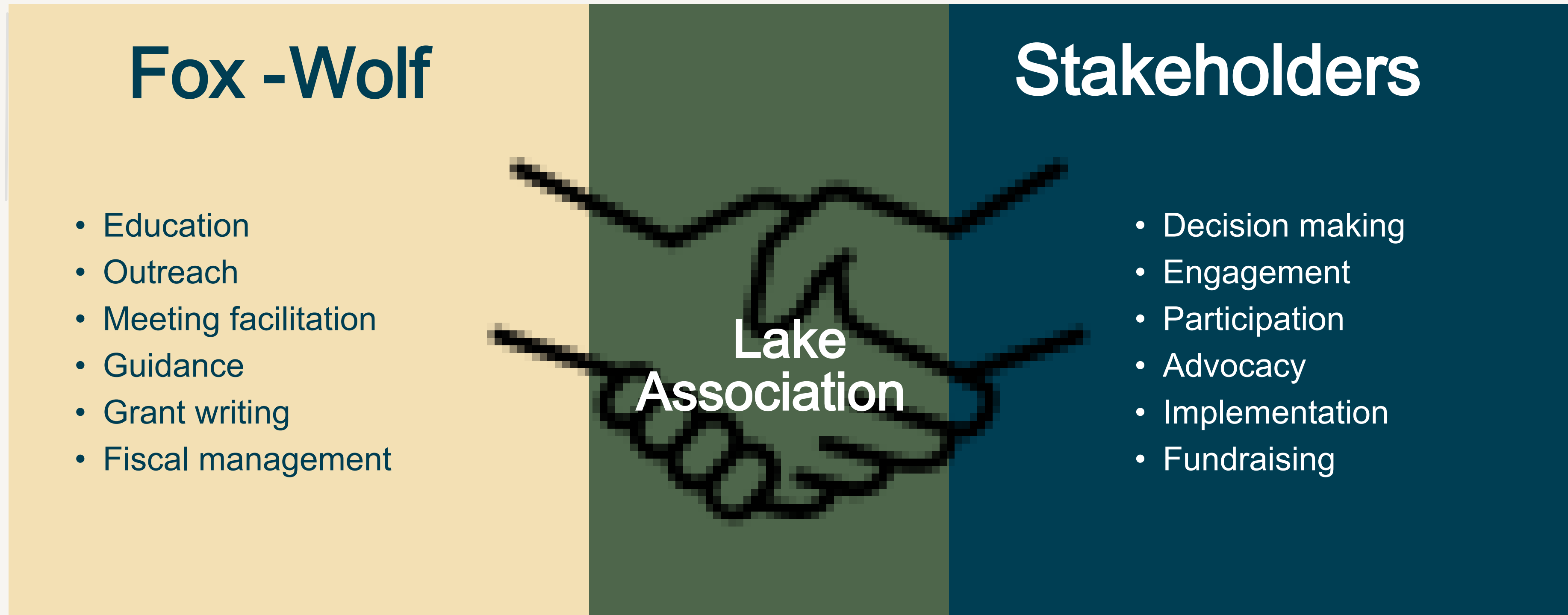

**PETITION FOR DIRECT ANNEXATION
PURSUANT TO SECTION 66.0217(2), WISCONSIN STATUTES**

We, the undersigned, constituting 100% all owners of the real property in the following territory of the Town of Neenah, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, petition the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Neenah to annex the territory described below and shown on the attached scaled map (Exhibit A) to the City of Neenah, Winnebago County, Wisconsin.

Part of the Southeast $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 29, Town 20 North, Range 17 East, Town of Neenah, Winnebago County, State of Wisconsin, containing 14,374 square feet (0.33 acres) of land described as follows:

Commencing at the South $\frac{1}{4}$ corner of Section 29, thence north along the east line of the Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$ said Section 29, 1,316.53 feet to the Northeast corner of Southeast $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$, thence S89°50'30"W, 874.00 feet along the North line of said Southeast $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$, thence S1°12'25"E, 163.00 feet, to the Point of Beginning; thence N69°27'38"E, 65.00; thence S1°12'22"E, 232.05 feet to the centerline of State Trunk Highway 114 (also known as W. Winneconne Avenue); thence S69°34'34"W, 65.00 feet along said centerline of State Trunk Highway 114; thence N1°11'40"W, 226.57 feet; to the Point of Beginning.
